

## Security Law and Policy of the European Union

The European Union is an increasingly important actor in international security policy. It has developed a Common Foreign and Security Policy (CFSP) and an already more than nascent European Security and Defence Policy (ESDP). In addition, the external implications of its Home and Justice Policy (HJP) are becoming ever more evident. The seminar analyses these developments and discusses their implications for the EU's contribution to European and global security. The approach of the seminar is interdisciplinary and combines legal with political science analysis. We will identify the pertinent European legal regulations in the CFSP, the ESDP and the HJP and discuss their relevance for the conduct of European internal and external politics. We will supplement these insights with state-of-the-art political science analyses and develop an integrated understanding of the European politics of security provision. Both approaches together will form an analytical background which helps to formulate hypotheses and suggestions for the future development of the EU's role in international security policy.
