Plagiarism in academia

Students demonstrate in their term papers and theses that they can develop knowledge independently and thus truthfully represent their own research process. A scientific paper is an independently written text based on an independently conducted empirical study and on knowledge of research findings of others. In accordance with good academic practice, references to other people's intellectual achievements must be cited in the author's own text (as well as in the bibliography) in a complete and comprehensible manner. Please find the guidelines for style and citation in academic papers at the Faculty of Social and Cultural Sciences here: https://www.kuwi.europa-uni.de/de/studium/_dateien/leitfaden_zitieren_en.pdf.

Indications that these principles have been violated in an academic paper will be considered an attempt at cheating. If there is an attempt to deceive during the examination performance (e.g. plagiarism in a term paper, deception in an exam), the performance is to be graded as "failed" (5.0). The chairperson of the examination board will be informed of the student's attempted cheating and will record it. The procedure can be found in the currently valid ASPO (dated 13.07.2022) in §21 on deception. There, paragraph (2) refers to the fact that "attempts to deceive [...] are to be recorded", which is particularly relevant in the case of repetition.

Self-plagiarism

Plagiarism in the sense described above must be distinguished from the reuse of texts (often referred to as "self-plagiarism") that were written by the author him/herself. When copying text passages from their own term papers into their (own) thesis, students should consult with their lecturers and cite the sources just as carefully as when copying from other texts.

AI and student writing

The use of AI tools is not generally forbidden at our faculty but it comes with particular challenges for unexperienced writers. For example, all content generated by AI has to be checked by authors in original scientific texts as any form of untrue content (so-called 'hallucinations', which are frequently produced by AI) is rated as an attempt to deceive. This will lead to rejection of the paper and may result in serious consequences for your studies. Please read the [guidelines](#) for the use of AI carefully and discuss them with your examiner if in doubt.

Digital submission of papers and theses

Theses and term papers are to be submitted in a print version and an electronic version (PDF file). By means of a plagiarism detection software, texts can be checked for plagiarism.

The digital submission of the bachelor thesis (as PDF, max. size of 5 MB) is now possible via upload in the Moodle course ["Einreichen der Abschlussarbeit - Kulturwissenschaftliche Fakultät"](#). After uploading, please send a short email to the responsible processor in the examination office so that she can retrieve the thesis (tesche@europa-uni.de).

Further notes

The required declaration of academic integrity of the final thesis or term paper should be taken seriously and is not only a formal part of a term paper, thesis or any other written assignment. Those who adhere to the rules of citation and prudently try to avoid (un)intentional plagiarism will be able to successfully complete their studies. If you have further questions about citation and sources in a specific subject, always consult the lecturers and professors at the faculty. Please also note that you have to sign a ["Declaration of Academic Integrity"](#) with any text that you hand in for official examination.

ViaCampus (Examination Management)

In the course catalogue on viaCampus you will find all courses as well as detailed information about the individual courses, e.g. a description of the course content, the credits to be earned, the course dates and the modules in which the course is offered. Some courses are available in more than one module, so please make sure that you register for the course in the correct module on viaCampus to ensure that the course is recorded correctly.

When we compile the course catalogue, we have good reasons for assigning or not assigning certain courses to certain modules. In principle, the module assignments in the course catalogue are therefore final and binding. If, in exceptional cases, you would like to attend a certain course in a module to which it is not assigned, even though it seems to fit the module's content, you can contact the programme coordinator (cuso@europa-uni.de) within the first three weeks of the semester and request an additional assignment.

At the Faculty of Social and Cultural Sciences we also record all your grades and achievements digitally in ViaCampus. So, please make sure that you register for all your courses in viaCampus until the end of the lecture period (ideally already in the beginning of the semester).

- With the registration in ViaCampus, the course, module, ECTS credits and type of achievement (e.g. term paper, presentation, certificate of attendance) are recorded in the student's account.
- Your grades and achievements are usually registered by the lecturer's secretary. In case of inquiries regarding unregistered achievements, please contact the lecturer and the secretary.
- You can view your grades in a transcript of records in ViaCampus, which can also be exported as a pdf file.
- The examination office uses the data in ViaCampus to check whether you are eligible to register for your bachelor's thesis and final exam, and to issue your diploma. So, please make sure in advance that your transcript is complete and correct.
- If you encounter any technical problems using ViaCampus, please contact the technical support.

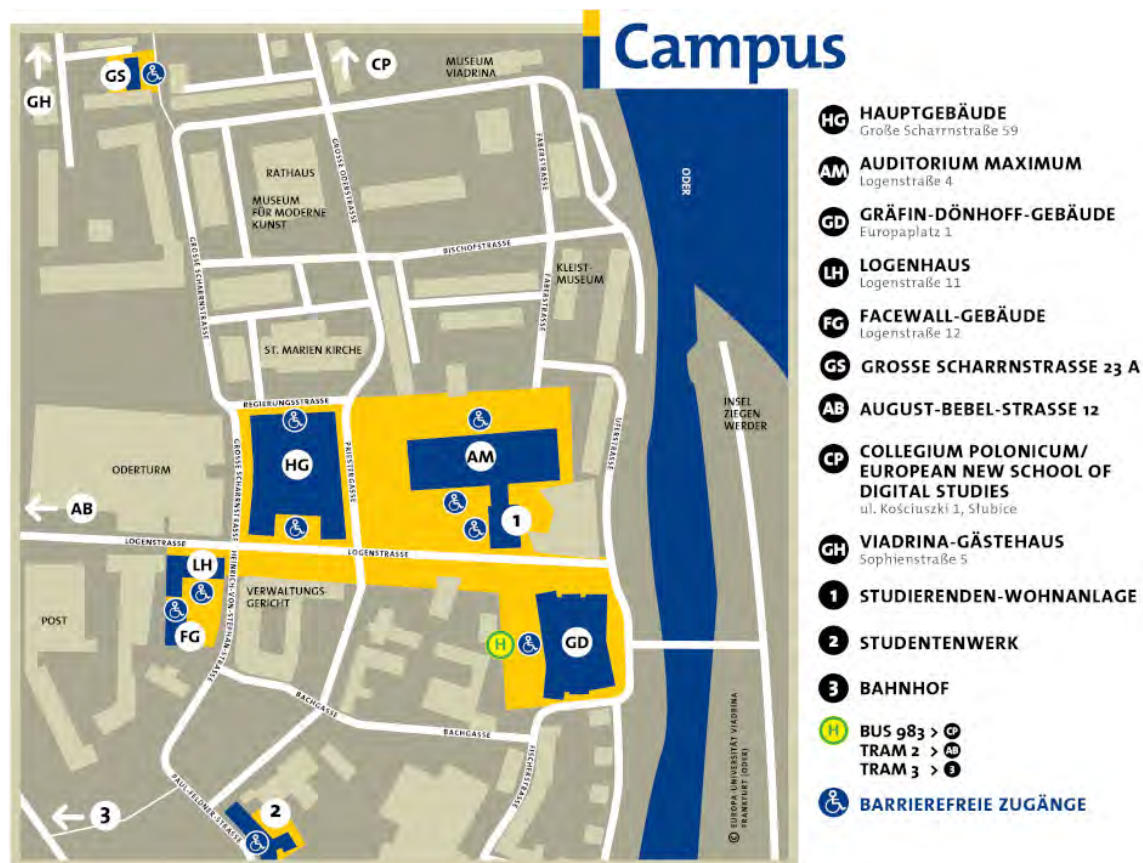

Between Legitimization and Criminalization: Robbery at Sea in the "Golden Age of Piracy" (1650-1730)

3/6/9 ECTS

Seminar (In-Person Course): Cultural History
Course Start: 13 Oct 2026 Tue, 11:15–12:45 Location: AM 202

Between 1650 and 1730, England's attitudes towards robbery at sea in the Atlantic and Caribbean underwent a fundamental change. For decades, "freebootery" had been used as a political and military weapon against competing colonial powers. Since the mid-seventeenth century, however, British authorities began to prosecute all sorts of robbery at sea as "piracy". Today's images of the "Golden Age of Piracy" are influenced and shaped by this criminalization of buccaneers as well as their romantic idealization as freedom fighters and radical democrats. In the seminar, we will analyze these narratives and representations which can be found both in popular culture and modern historical research. Interpreting selected primary and secondary sources, we will address early modern piracy between its politico-military instrumentalization on the one hand and its prosecution on the other hand, comparing the violence of the buccaneers with the violence of the governmental authorities who tried to impose a juridical, political and economic order on the maritime space. We will examine depictions of pirate social orders and anti-orders as well as the religious ideas of those "villains of all nations" who, in the eyes of many, had fundamentally renounced Christianity. Finally, the seminar is to show that from the early 18th century, robbery at sea and the scientific exploration of the world, which had been closely intertwined for more than two hundred years, began to be separated.

Requirements for Participation: Good reading skills in English are required, German reading skills are not required but would be an advantage.

Kulturkritik ist eine Praxis der Selbstreflexion, in der je eigene gesellschaftliche Lebensformen und Wertsetzungen hinterfragt werden. Nach ersten Ansätzen in der Antike gewinnt dieses Denken im 16. Jahrhundert eine Gestalt, die der europäischen Zivilisation den Spiegel einer „edlen Wildheit“ vorhält, bei Michel de Montaigne und frühen Gegnern der Kolonisierung vor allem. Zur Entfaltung kommt Kulturkritik dann in der Zeit der Aufklärung, in der die Begriffe der Kultur und der Kritik eine neue Bedeutung erhalten. Seitdem sieht sich das Fortschrittsversprechen der Moderne mit einem Einwand konfrontiert, der die verheißenen Gewinne von Rationalisierung, Ökonomisierung und Verwissenschaftlichung mit deren Kosten und Verlusten verrechnet. Nach einzelnen Schlaglichtern auf die Frühe Neuzeit werden wir im Seminar die vielschichtige Entwicklung der Kulturkritik als Reflexionsfigur der europäischen Moderne analysieren. Wir verfolgen die kritische Zeitdiagnostik von der Aufklärung des 18. Jahrhunderts über kulturpessimistische Strömungen des Fin de siècle bis hin zu soziologischen und psychoanalytischen Ansätzen im frühen 20. Jahrhundert und nehmen dabei auch unterschiedliche politisch-ideologische Positionen in den Blick – um so zu einer historischen Kritik der Kulturkritik zu gelangen.

From Paris to Moscow and back. Central and Eastern Europe under Napoleon's Rule

3/6/9 ECTS

Napoleonic rule in Central and Eastern Europe evokes very different connotations in the historical consciousness of Germany, Poland, and Russia. While Napoleon's powerful intervention marked, for the German states, the end of the Holy Roman Empire and a radical redrawing of the political map east of the Rhine, a divided Poland hoped for France's involvement in regaining its statehood and national sovereignty. For Russia, on the other hand, the victorious defense against the Grande Armée in 1812 was to become a cornerstone of its national identity. But no state in Central and Eastern Europe could henceforth ignore the fundamental questions that Napoleonic rule had posed to them: those concerning the legal equality of citizens, constitutions and fundamental rights, the emancipation of peasants, and political participation.

On Time: Temporality and Historicity in Modern Historical Thought

3/6/9 ECTS

Seminar (In-Person Course): Cultural History

"Time" is one of the central yet often implicit categories of historical thinking. This seminar examines the emergence, transformations, and possible crisis of modern historical temporality from the late eighteenth century to the present. We will begin by exploring Reinhart Koselleck's influential account of how modern historical thought came to be organized around notions of progress, acceleration, novelty, and an open future. The seminar then turns to influential critiques of the modern conception of time and history, including that of Walter Benjamin, and investigates contemporary diagnoses of a "crisis of the modern time regime". Drawing on the works of François Hartog, Aleida Assmann, Hartmut Rosa, and others, we will discuss concepts such as "presentism" and examine ongoing debates about the changing relationship between past, present, and future.

La bataille du bleu : un conflit franco-allemand pour l'appropriation d'une couleur (1700-1900).

3/6/9 ECTS

Seminar (In-Person Course): Cultural History

L'histoire de la peinture met traditionnellement en avant les conflits entre les styles et les écoles. Longtemps considérée comme peu pertinente pour comprendre la création, dont la part intellectuelle est particulièrement vénérée, la matérialité de l'art a été peu étudiée. En réalité, les artistes ont toujours eu une connaissance précise des matériaux et sélectionnaient les meilleurs pigments pour leurs œuvres. L'un d'entre eux, le bleu, était difficile à obtenir : rare dans la nature, ce pigment était soit très cher (autant que la feuille d'or), soit trop pâle ou trop peu solide. L'invention du bleu de Prusse en 1704 à Berlin a totalement transformé la palette des artistes, pour la peinture mais aussi pour la céramique ou la teinture des textiles. Au cours du XVIII^e siècle, en France, de nombreuses tentatives d'imitation ou de contrefaçon du bleu de Prusse ont été entreprises, dans une course effrénée à la technologie. Ce cours vise à faire évoluer le point de vue traditionnel des études d'histoire de l'art, en remplaçant l'étude de la matière dans une compréhension plus globale de l'évolution des pratiques artistiques. Il examinera l'évolution de la technologie artistique au cours des XVIII^e et XIX^e siècles et montrera comment l'art s'est transformé avec la création de nouveaux matériaux artistiques. Il étudiera également la lutte entre la France et les pays germaniques pour développer les meilleurs matériaux, ainsi que le commerce des produits artistiques entre les deux pays.

Russian Hybrid Warfare against Ukraine, 1991–2013/2014

3/6/9 ECTS

Seminar (In-Person Course): Central and East European Studies
Course Start: 14 Oct 2026 Wed, 16:15–17:45 Location: AM 204

The annexation of Crimea and the military conflict in Eastern Ukraine, which evolved in 2014 following the Euromaidan protests, were widely perceived, especially from abroad, as a sudden and unexpected crisis between Russia and Ukraine. This was, however, only the next military dimension of Russia's long-lasting pressure on Ukraine since the proclamation of its independence in 1991. Post-communist Ukraine was heavily influenced by Russia at the political, economic, and cultural levels. This sustained pressure can be characterised as Russian hybrid warfare against Ukraine, through which Russia tried to keep Ukraine within its sphere of influence by all means. This seminar examines the multiple instruments of control that Russia employed before initiating open military conflict. These include the status of Crimea and the stationing of the Russian Black Sea Fleet; the transfer of Ukraine's nuclear arsenal to Russia under the 1994 Budapest Memorandum; asymmetrical economic relations; Ukraine's structural dependence on Russia's energy supplies; information warfare; and Russia's direct involvement in Ukraine's domestic politics, most visibly during the Orange Revolution of 2004 and Euromaidan protests of 2013/2014. Russia's cultural expansion in the former Soviet republics, with the promotion of the idea of the so-called 'Russian World' (russkij mir) centered on the Russian language, culture, and Orthodoxy, also played a significant role. The course is chronologically and partially thematically organised, drawing on diverse sources and recent scholarly literature in political science, security studies, and history, and sheds light on the pre-history of the ongoing Russian war against Ukraine.

Philosophy and Colonialism: On Epistemic Violence

3/6/9 ECTS

Seminar (In-Person Course): Philosophy and Arts in Times of Crisis
Course Start: 15 Oct 2026 Thu, 14:15–15:45 Location: AM 202

This seminar explores the links between modern concepts of race, the development of colonial capitalism and key positions in Western philosophy. Taking the Iberian conquests of the Americas as its starting point, the course reconstructs the philosophical patterns used to legitimise land appropriation, enslavement and colonial warfare between the 16th and 19th centuries. We begin by discussing how the jurists of the Salamanca School (Francisco de Vitoria and others) – despite their criticism of the excessive brutality of the Conquista – created new international and natural law definitions of global trade, property, and war, in order to morally justify the subjugation and enslavement of Amerindian populations as well as the acquisition of African slaves. We then turn to 17th-century social contract theories: what natural law arguments did Thomas Hobbes and John Locke employ to nullify the sovereignty and property rights of the First Nations? What concepts of "uncultivated wastelands", "lawless spaces", "non-sovereign people", and "enslavable bodies" did they create? In the final part of the seminar, we examine the significance of colonial racism and slavery within the philosophical systems of Kant and Hegel. Key questions of the course are: How could philosophical discourses, whose key concepts included universality, legal personhood and freedom, defend Euro-colonialism? How did their patterns of epistemic violence differ? What metamorphoses did the concept of race undergo in its interplay of cultural and biological articulations? Are critical counter-readings of the texts we discuss possible on the basis of their own arguments?

KI-Dämonologie

Seminar (In-Person Course): Aesthetics of Audio-Visual Media

Schon 2014 warnte (ausgerechnet) Elon Musk davor, dass unser Umgang mit KI einer Dämonenbeschwörung gleichkäme. Neuere Entwicklungen scheinen dieser Warnung einige Evidenz zu verleihen. Schließlich besteht das Kerngeschäft der sogenannten generativen KI – also von LLM (Large Language Models) wie ChatGPT, Claude und Gemini – darin, gesammelte Daten in neue Texte oder Bilder umzuorganisieren; nicht selten erweckt die KI dabei den Eindruck, den Nutzer*innen als Wesen mit eigenem Bewusstsein, mit Initiative und Willen zu begegnen. Dieser Eindruck wird noch durch die bekannte Neigung der LLM verstärkt, Quellen zu halluzinieren: also etwa auf Bücher und Aufsätze zu verweisen, die zumindest in unserem Raum-Zeit-Kontinuum (noch) nicht geschrieben worden sind. Nimmt man den traurigen Umstand hinzu, dass nicht nur die KI selbst Halluzinationen entwickelt, sondern auch diejenigen, die sich mit ihr beschäftigen, mitunter von der Wirklichkeit, die sie bewohnen sollten, wegbrechen und in dunkle und destruktive Paralleldimensionen wegdriften, so überrascht es nicht, dass die Technologie hier buchstäblich dämonisiert wird. Tatsächlich gibt es auf einschlägigen Website mittlerweile zahlreiche Artikel, die den Verbindungen zwischen KI und Dämonologie nachgehen und dabei etwa auf Loab, angeblich die erste KI-Dämonin, verweisen. Das Seminar ist als Lektürekurs angelegt. Wir werden das Dämonische wissenschaftlich ernst nehmen, indem wir es auf eine Theologie des Bösen beziehen. Auf dieser Grundlage wollen wir der Frage nachgehen, ob uns dämonologische Diskurse dabei helfen können, besser zu verstehen, in welchem Sinn die KI überkommene Konzepte vom Menschen, von Politik und Gemeinschaft herausfordert. Dabei gilt es stets zu bedenken, dass der Begriff des Dämonischen in sich ambivalent ist: Für Dieter Mersch etwa ist der Dämon derjenige, der uns aus erstarrten Ordnungen und Systemen befreit.

Soviet Ukraine and the World: Cold War Cultural Diplomacy, Material Culture, and Fashion

3/6/9 ECTS

Seminar (In-Person Course): Central and East European Studies

How did clothing, consumer goods, visual media, and international exhibitions become instruments of Cold War politics? This course examines Soviet Ukraine as an active participant in global cultural politics and challenges narratives that reduce it to a passive Soviet periphery. It approaches the Ukrainian SSR as one of the Soviet Union's major centers of cultural production and representation, whose institutions, objects, and visual forms circulated across the Soviet Union and internationally. Students will explore consumption and scarcity, fashion institutions and women's creative labor, youth subcultures, and the politics of heritage and "national style." Case studies will range from fashion houses and women's magazines to cultural diplomacy, Expo 67 in Montreal, and Ukrainian diaspora activism in North America and Europe. Through discussion, film screenings, and hands-on work with photographs, periodicals, and audiovisual sources, students will learn how to analyze visual and material culture as historical evidence and examine how objects and images shaped ideas of modernity, national identity, and cultural difference during the Cold War.

In this seminar we examine the central role that sexuality and its gendered regulation hold in the ideologies and practices of racist domination. We will address sexuality as an element of racist Othering and phantasies of national decline, but also focus on the control and regulation of sexuality as an element of racist practices of governing. This focus will be examined through historical examples that include histories of European colonialism, through discourses of eugenics as an ideology and political programme that seeks to 'breed' qualitative traits of human populations, and through focusing on contemporary right-wing discourses on immigration in Germany and beyond.

Language/s and the body in interaction

Seminar (In-Person Course): Language and the Body
Course Start: 23 Oct 2026 Fri, 11:15–12:45 Location: AM 103

In this seminar, we are going to explore how the body and verbal language together shape meaning-making processes in multilingual interactions. The seminar will be divided into three thematic parts: a theoretical part, an introduction to qualitative empirical research, and a hands-on research project. Theoretically, we will discuss texts from the fields of multilingualism, interactional linguistics, and multimodality and gesture studies. Methodologically, we will discuss approaches to qualitative research with a focus on working with video data. At the end of term, you will be ready to present your own research project at a student conference. This student conference will be held together with the course "Language – Body – Machine" on 5.2.2027. By the end of this seminar, you will have an understanding of the theoretical foundations of empirical work and of multilingualism in interaction. Additionally, this course offers you the possibility to collect data in preparation for a Master's thesis.

Seminar (In-Person Course): Gender and Queer Studies
Course Start: 13 Oct 2026 Tue, 11:15–12:45 Location: GD 07

Der im Fokus des Seminars stehende stadtwissenschaftliche und stadtpolitische Ansatz der ‚sorgenden Städte‘ ist aus feministischen Debatten zu Sorgearbeit, sozialer Reproduktion und räumlicher Ungleichheit hervorgegangen und gewinnt in der Erforschung, Politik und Planung von Städten zunehmend an Bedeutung. Feministische Forschungen zeigen seit langem, dass für das soziale Miteinander essenzielle Care-Arbeiten im weiteren Sinne eines Füreinander-Sorge-Tragens und einer alltäglichen Organisation des Zusammenlebens überwiegend von Frauen geleistet werden. Die Stadtentwicklungspolitik wiederum blendet diese reproduktive Dimension der Stadt weitgehend aus. Die Ausgestaltung urbaner Räume spiegelt so die Ungleichheit gesellschaftlicher Geschlechterverhältnisse. Das Konzept der sorgenden Stadt fordert daher einen Perspektivwechsel, der reproduktive Fragen des gesellschaftlichen Lebens zum Ausgangspunkt der Stadtentwicklung macht. In seinem Zentrum stehen u.a. soziale Infrastrukturen, bezahlbares Wohnen, wohnortnahe Versorgung, öffentliche Gesundheit, barrierefreie Mobilität, nachbarschaftliche Solidarität, Stadtnatur. Zudem geht es darum, Sorgearbeit gesellschaftlich anzuerkennen und zu demokratisieren. Das Seminar verfolgt das Ziel, die politischen und sozialen Verflechtungen zwischen Sorgearbeit und Stadtentwicklung sowohl theoretisch zu erfassen als auch in der urbanen Praxis zu untersuchen. Im Fokus steht die Frage, wie Städte zu Orten werden können, die Vulnerabilität und wechselseitige Fürsorge nicht als Defizite, sondern als grundlegende Bedingungen menschlichen Zusammenlebens anerkennen.

Signs of Hate: Linguistic and Multimodal Approaches to Hate Speech

3/6/9 ECTS

Seminar (In-Person Course): Language in Society // Language in Media Cultures

Course Start: 13 Oct 2026 Tue, 14:15–15:45 Location: AM 233

Hate Speech is a ubiquitous phenomenon particularly in the polarised environments of digital communication. Yet, defining what is and isn't hate speech can prove difficult as neither hate as an acutely experienced emotion on part of the speaker nor speech in a traditional sense of speaking are required to produce hate speech. In this seminar, we will start out by learning and discussing different definitions of hate speech, and differentiating it from other phenomena of harmful speech (such as insults and invectives). We will then turn to different manifestations of hate speech, reaching from language to symbols to images. While the focus lies on contemporary practices of hate speech with a particular focus on digital environments, these perspectives will be enriched by tracing the historical genealogies of prevalent structures and metaphors in hate speech. The seminar will provide literature-based discussions of concepts and theories in the beginning of the semester, before it then moves on to analysing empirical material in class. Content note: Due to the topic of the seminar, we will work with highly graphic, offensive, and violent material that predominantly concerns marginalised groups. Please consider in advance if you have the emotional capacity to work with such material.

Digital Ethnography

3/6/9 ECTS

Seminar (In-Person Course): Language in Media Cultures
Course Start: 14 Oct 2026 Wed, 9:15–10:45 Location: AM 205

Ethnographic research is about exploring the hidden complexities of everyday social doings and trying to understand them from the perspective of the people involved in them. In this course, we will learn about the application of this research approach to the study of digitally-mediated social practices and their cultural significance in context, asking questions like: How do different people understand and value their digital communicative practices? How can we observe community emerge in digital spaces? Is what happens online even "real life"? The course will first introduce the fundamental ideas behind ethnographic research before exploring how ethnography has "gone online" over the last thirty years or so. To do this, we will read and discuss published digital ethnographic work as well as engage with methodological debates like: What does it mean to do "fieldwork" on (and off) the Internet? What ethical imperatives apply? How does our positioning as digital ethnographers shape our accounts? Students will have the opportunity to conduct their own small ethnographies on digital cultural practices of their choice and write about their findings, either in multiple reflective essays or in one long seminar paper (*Hausarbeit*).

Der Sowjetische Sicherheitsdienst: Gestern und Heute

3/6/9 ECTS

Seminar (In-Person Course): Cultural History
Course Start: 14 Oct 2026 Wed, 9:15–10:45 Location: GD 204

Das Seminar beschäftigt sich mit der Geschichte des sowjetischen Sicherheitsdienstes, der mehrmals umbenannt und umstrukturiert wurde. Seine Hauptaufgaben waren: Bekämpfung von Staatsverbrechen, darunter Vaterlandsverrat, Spionage, Konterrevolution, Terrorismus, Sabotage und Vandalismus; Schutz von Staatsgeheimnissen; Unterbindung von Staatsverbrechen; Erfüllung spezieller Aufgaben der Regierung der UdSSR zur Gewährleistung der staatlichen Sicherheit und der öffentlichen Ordnung. Der Sicherheitsdienst im Rahmen des Innenministeriums (rus. NKWD 1934–1941) spielte eine dominierende Rolle beim Terror der 1930er Jahre, in dessen Verlauf er unzählige Verhaftungen, Verhöre und Hinrichtungen durchführte. Die Geheimpolizei wurde zur wichtigsten Stütze der persönlichen Diktatur Stalins: Sie wurde nicht nur gegen die Bevölkerung und die Intelligenz eingesetzt, sondern auch gegen die Partei, das Militär und die Regierung. Nach der kurzzeitigen (1941) und erneuten (1943) Herauslösung der politischen Geheimpolizei als NKGB wurde dieses 1946 mit der 1943 gegründeten Spionageabwehrorganisation SMERSch (für: „Tod den Spionen“) zum Ministerium für Staatssicherheit (MGB) zusammengefasst, aus dem 1954 das KGB (Komitee für Staatssicherheit) hervorging. Das KGB spielte eine wichtige Rolle im Kalten Krieg. Große Teile der KGB-Strukturen gingen nach dem Zerfall der Sowjetunion 1991 in die heutigen russischen Dienste FSB (Föderaler Sicherheitsdienst) und dem SWR (Auslandsnachrichtendienst) auf. Das Seminar findet in Präsenz statt. Die regelmäßige Teilnahme und Bereitschaft zu Lektüreleistungen werden vorausgesetzt.

Zu einem werden Motivationen und Erfahrungen von Touristen diskutiert, zum anderen werden Kulturerbe, touristische Infrastruktur und Marketing behandelt. Warum teilen Touristen Selfies von Orten der Tragödie? Das Seminar findet in Präsenz statt. From Automatism to Algorithm: Surrealism and its Critical Legacies

3/6/9 ECTS

Seminar (In-Person Course): Aesthetics of Audio-Visual Media // Philosophy and Arts in Times of Crisis
Course Start: 13 Oct 2026 Tue, 11:15–12:45 Location: AM 204

Officially founded in 1924, with the publication of André Breton's manifesto, Surrealism has been exerting a lasting influence in art, culture and theory and continues to prompt a host of responses in our anxiety-ridden present. Influenced by communism and psychoanalysis alike, the movement's aesthetics and aspirations were mainly grounded in the notion of "pure psychic automatism" as a method of representing, in both literature and the visual arts, the desires, dreams and drives of the human "unconscious" as revolutionary forces to challenge the bourgeois order of an industrial modernity deemed repressive (if not worse). Practices of *écriture automatique*, i.e. modes of writing or drawing performed without conscious control and intent, aimed at liberating rational Western subjectivity through access to a projected Other and primordial past. On the one hand the seminar will revisit the history of Surrealism in the works and words of, among others, Breton and Georges Bataille, Max Ernst, Man Ray, Yves Tanguy, André Masson, Salvador Dalí, Meret Oppenheim, Claude Cahun and Raoul Ubac, to critically engage with the politics (and aporias) of automatism and its multi-faceted manifestations. On the other hand, this course will take a more experimental approach by focusing on legacies of Surrealism in contemporary art and digital media culture, asking how its historical quest for both the marvelous and the uncanny with recourse to the unconscious is transformed by automatism becoming algorithmic. To this end, readings by philosophers and scholars like N. Katherine Hayles and Marie-Luise Angerer relative to the "digital unconscious" as a terrain where bodies and computation meet will be discussed in light of recent works by artists like Pierre Huyghe, Adrian Villar Rojas, Hito Steyerl and Annika Yi that arguably gauge and exacerbate the vicissitudes of imagining the "the world through AI".

Human Rights in Times of Crisis

3/6/9 ECTS

Seminar: Central and East European Studies
Course Start: 14 Oct 2026 Wed, 14:00–16:00

This course examines the complex legal, political, and operational challenges of protecting human rights during state emergencies, armed conflicts, public health crises, and environmental disasters. Designed for Master's students, the course explores how international human rights law (IHRL) adapts to conditions of severe societal stress, where states are forced to balance national security and public order against their international human rights obligations. Particular emphasis will be placed on the development of human rights institutions, legislation and practices in connection with Russia's war of aggression against Ukraine, as well as on human rights issues and specific case studies in Ukraine. Students will critically analyze the mechanism of derogation from human rights treaties (Article 15 ECHR, Article 4 ICCPR), the boundary between non-derogable rights and permissible limitations, and the interplay between IHRL, International Humanitarian Law (IHL), and emergency domestic legislation. Special focus is given to modern crisis scenarios, including hybrid warfare, informational threats, digital surveillance under emergency powers, forced displacement, and the protection of vulnerable populations during ongoing crises.

The Right to Truth

3/6/9 ECTS

Seminar (In-Person Course): Central and East European Studies
Course Start: 15 Oct 2026 Thu, 9:00–11:00 Location: AM 202

This course offers an in-depth, interdisciplinary exploration of the emergence, normative evolution, and practical enforcement of the Right to Truth (droit à la vérité) in modern international law and global politics. Originally developed to address enforced disappearances and gross human rights violations in Latin America, the Right to Truth has transformed into an autonomous human right and a cornerstone of democratic accountability, transitional justice, and informational security. Ukraine is used as a case study throughout this course. Students will examine both the individual dimension (the right of victims and their families to know the fate of missing persons and the circumstances of atrocities) and the collective dimension (the right of society to an accurate historical record, protection against state-sponsored disinformation, and access to archives) of the right to truth. The course critically addresses modern challenges, including memory politics, the criminalization of historical denialism, the role of digital evidence/open-source intelligence (OSINT), and the protection of cognitive security during ongoing conflicts and post-conflict transitions.

This course provides a comprehensive, interdisciplinary introduction to the theory, legal frameworks, and practical mechanisms of Transitional Justice (TJ), that will be discussed on the example and in-depth case studies on Ukraine. Designed for Master's students, the course explores how societies emerging from armed conflicts, mass human rights atrocities, or authoritarian regimes confront legacies of past abuses. Students will critically examine the four pillars of Transitional Justice: criminal prosecutions, truth-seeking mechanisms, reparations, and guarantees of non-recurrence (institutional reform and vetting). Im Rahmen dieser Lehrveranstaltung wollen wir uns feministischen Bewegungen aus einer sozialwissenschaftlichen und zugleich zeithistorischen Forschungsperspektive nähern. Memes, Meanings, and Blind Spots: How internet culture shapes European values

Practical Seminar (In-Person Course): Practice

In times of information overload and populist narratives, traditional institutional communication is failing to reach younger audiences. Meanwhile, European values like democracy and solidarity are being actively debated, dismantled, and redefined through internet culture. In this seminar, we will dive into the internet's critical blind spots. We will explore digital shibboleths, the "irony gap" (where online humour masks political intent), and "algorithmic westsplainning" (how global tech platforms misread local cultural nuances in European borderlands). Focusing on digital narratives and visual vernaculars surrounding migration debates and the integration of Ukrainian refugees, we will use the unique border context of Frankfurt (Oder)/Stübice to decode the hidden mechanics of digital crisis communication. You won't just analyse the digital world – you will influence it with your own media project. After conducting a strategic audit of Viadrina's communication platforms, you will design, build, and launch a public-facing media project, such as a studio podcast or a digital platform takeover.

Seminar (In-Person Course): Philosophy and Arts in Times of Crisis
Course Start: 12 Oct 2026 Mon, 14:15–15:45 Location: GD 04

Tanzperformances im Rahmen feministischer Streiks, Kartoffelbreiwürfe auf berühmte Gemälde durch Klimaaktivist*innen, Auseinandersetzungen um die Berlinale im Kontext der Palästina-Proteste oder die Instrumentalisierung von KI-generierten Bildern und Videos durch rechte Bewegungen: Kunst ist längst wieder zu einem politischen Kampffeld in Europa geworden. Rechte wie linke Bewegungen nutzen ästhetische Mittel, um Aufmerksamkeit zu erzeugen und politische Deutungsmacht zu erringen. Das Seminar geht der Frage nach, ob Kunst heute ein emanzipatorisches Mittel politischen Protests sein kann, oder ob sie regressiv zu werden droht. Wir nähern uns dieser Frage zunächst über die philosophische Debatte, ob Kunst einem politischen Zweck dienen sollte, oder ob gerade ihre Autonomie ihre politische Kraft ausmacht (Block 1). In einem zweiten Schritt, analysieren wir, unter welchen Bedingungen Kunst progressiv sein kann, und wann sie in kapitalistischen Verhältnissen in Ideologie abgeleitet (Block 2). Schließlich richten wir unseren analytischen Fokus auf soziale Bewegungen in Europa, ihre Aneignung von Kunst sowie ihre eigenen ästhetischen Praktiken. Wir analysieren konkrete Beispiele aus progressiven Bewegungen im Bereich Klima und Migration (Block 3) sowie aus heutigen rechten Bewegungen mit Fokus auf deren Nutzung von KI und digitalen Plattformen (Block 4). Neben der Lektüre zentraler Texte arbeiten wir mit aktuellen Fallstudien, diskutieren Kunstwerke und Performances und erproben kreative Formate wie die gemeinsame Analyse von Bildern, Videos oder Ausstellungen.

Dieses Seminar führt in die theoretischen Grundlagen kulturwissenschaftlicher Perspektiven auf Sprache ein. Kulturwissenschaftliche Linguistik betrachtet Sprache nicht als stabiles System oder kognitiven *a priori* Code, der in individuellen Hirnen lagert und zum Zwecke der Kommunikation abgerufen werden kann. Vielmehr werden die diversen und multimodalen Formen von Sprache als Effekt von und konstitutiv für soziale Praxis verstanden. Diese Praxis stellt performativ und in der Interaktion Bedeutung, soziale Beziehungen und Vergemeinschaftung her. Die mediale Qualität (oral, schriftlich, gestisch, audio-visuell, digital etc.) von Äußerungen wird als Element von Bedeutung verstanden. Medien, worunter wir auch mündliche Sprache fassen, sind also nicht ‚Verpackungen‘ sondern wesentlicher Teil von sozial-praktisch vermittelten Bedeutungen. Interaktion stellt medial vermittelte Bedeutungen her, die zugleich Identität, soziale Gruppen, öffentliche Räume und soziale Hierarchien produzieren. Die komplexen Zusammenhänge zwischen Sprache, Medium und Gesellschaft und das Verständnis von Sprache als Medium, wollen wir auf der Grundlage von einführenden Texten und durch die Lektüre von ‚Klassikern‘ kulturwissenschaftlicher, anthropologischer und medientheoretischer Betrachtungen besser verstehen lernen. Studierende sollten bereit sein, sich intensiv mit theoretischer Fachliteratur auseinanderzusetzen. Um die methodischen Zugänge des Feldes kennenzulernen, bereiten Studierende Methodenpräsentationen vor, die sie im Anschluss in kurzen Texten darstellen und den Kursteilnehmenden zur Verfügung stellen.

Im Seminar sollen ausgewählte Gedichte (Die Niemandsrose, Sprachgitter, Fadensonnen) die Reden (Büchner Preis Rede von 1960), Essays, Briefe und Interviews von Paul Celan im Mittelpunkt stehen. Der thematische Fokus liegt dabei auf Celans Poetik der Anthropologie, mit der er immer wieder über Topoi wie „Atem“, „Mund“, „Körper“, „Hand“ Parallelen zwischen Mensch und Gedicht zieht. Diese Re-Anthropologisierung soll auch in Relation zu Hinweisen auf geologische, geographische, biologische und andere naturwissenschaftliche Lexik analysiert werden. Celan möchte mit seinen Gedichten in komprimierter Form die Grenzen von Wissen neu bestimmen: Was kann bzw. kann nicht gesagt werden, wie entstehen Aussagen, auf welche semantische Felder rekurrieren sie etc. In einem zweiten Teil werden wir seine Lyrik auch international kontextualisieren und seinen Lebensweg als deutschsprachiger Dichter aus der Bukowina von Czernowitz, Bukarest über Wien bis nach Paris nachzeichnen.

The last thirty years have brought several significant changes into the way the heritage is understood, researched and practiced. On the one hand, according to the development of global tourism, the rise of the great museums and the extension of the world heritage list have introduced the globalization within the heritage sector. The inclusion of non-European cultures has opened some new perspectives (for instant on the immaterial heritage) but made also the understanding and analysing of heritage more complex. Mainly because of the mass tourism and increasing participation the heritage became a subject to economy and to political representation. All these practices are more and more critically reflected within political, social and cultural studies. For getting an overview of several aspects in this spectrum we are going to use a particular handbook. It develops through its various sections and chapters an accessible and clearly presented vision of heritage as a cultural process designed for use by students, advance scholars and practitioners alike. The Box with Special Contents: Architecture and Museography Inside and Outside the Museum

6 ECTS

Seminar (In-Person Course): Cultural History

This seminar will explore a range of issues related to the museum as both an architectural and curatorial space, with particular attention to the development of architectural staging, display strategies, conservation practices, and museography during the nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. The principal case studies will be Berlin's oldest and most renowned museums, including the Altes Museum, Neues Museum, Alte Nationalgalerie, and Bode-Museum. A series of introductory lectures will examine the ideological premises underlying these institutions and the ways in which such ideas were translated into contemporary aesthetic forms. Building on this foundation, we will investigate on site the design strategies employed in architectural expression and decoration, as well as the functional and technical dimensions of museum spaces. Particular emphasis will be placed on the relationship between museum interiors, key objects, and decorative programs, which will be discussed from an interdisciplinary and comparative perspective.
